In light of today's (26/09/2022) report by the Black Equality Organisation stating that 65% of Black people said they had been discriminated against by healthcare professionals because of their ethnicity Outling that ' Black people face considerable discrimination and exclusion, especially in public services such as healthcare and the criminal justice system. In particular, 75% of 18-34 year olds and 69% of Black Africans said they were discriminated against by healthcare professionals because of their ethnicity [1] I'd like to raise the following questions with the Board	Healthwatch Rochdale Board appreciates the report and data being brought to their attention.
