The report will be available on our ROMVP website for anyone who might like to read through. • Antenatal Update - Pregnancy Circles to be started in January 2024 as part of Antenatal Offer. If the first session is successful it is intended these will be continued and rolled out at different venues. • PPEG Meeting with Trust – Ruth attended this meeting and whilst on it was notified that the local Tongue Tie Clinic at Oldham was to be suspended as no staff to carry it out. Currently had 2 midwives in training, but been unable to fulfil due to short notice of long term absence of lead midwife who carried out. We have been assured via the Head of Midwifery that this issue has been raised and escalated as an area for concern. Alongside this she has assured us that they are doing all they can to ensure that the two trainees are well supported. One midwife is due to complete training in January and the other April. With this in mind the Trust is hopeful that the service will be reinstated by the	To collate all Tongue Tie feedback and present to the Trust at end of January 2024.	ALL	Jan 2024
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They have asked for support from neighbouring Trusts and Ear, Nose and Throat Teams. All have said they are at full capacity themselves. The concerns around the suspension of this service is already attracting comments and feedback to our ROMVP social media accounts that are concerning. This issue has been escalated a number of ways: Healthwatch Rochdale – as a speech and language concern Commissioners for both Rochdale and Oldham Put on the "Risk" register from a Heath Visitor Rochdale perspective. GMEC MNVP's Trust Divisional Manager

Steph: I am one of the local "Trainee Midwives" currently studying really hard to get this tongue tie qualification. I can update that I am not being offered any support at all and that there is nothing in place. I am obviously limited at this time as to what I can say, but I find this very upsetting. I fought to be on the course, we have to be supervised doing 25 cuts and assignments relating to this – it is a very difficult Masters level course and I have enjoyed every moment so far. My colleague and I are hoping to qualify ASAP.









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			Leona: Faith has assured us that all training is being supported via Lesley at the Trust? Steph: Sue is currently trying her hardest to work with the ENT team to pass ASAP. Zainab: There is a new member of the team joining from Wythenshawe Hospital. She ran a clinic there prior to coming to Oldham, she will be supporting the ENT team. Leona: Hasn't Wythenshawe also just withdrawn their service? Maybe its as the midwife has now moved Trusts to our end? Rachel: As a Rochdale Team we have highlighted the tongue tie as a risk. We are ensuring that health visitors and midwives are still referring into the tongue tie service as this will ensure we have a paper trail of evidence of how much the service is

	As part of the Infant feeding strand steering group initiated to ensure service users voices are heard. Key to the 5 year strategy. Currently two surveys taking place one for professionals and one for parents. Response rates have been positive, survey for service users has been extended for an additional 2 weeks to gain further insight but the feedback received so far has been very rich in content and will help shape the service. This also is helping with our Data Mapping as part of DFE compliance. Currently recruiting for a number of roles to strengthen the infant feeding offer in Rochdale as gaps have been identified. This includes a Parent education Midwife, Parent education Health Visitor and 2 early years supporters – all with a focus on infant feeding.	To Share Data around findings	SD	March 2024

Leona: Is the infant feeding support worker role a paid position and is it as a peer support model?

Rachel: This is a paid role

Leona: Based on our service user feedback and discussions with women they tell us that they prefer someone in a role such as this to have lived experiences as in peer support.

Rachel: It is difficult to ensure that we can employ someone with the peer support but the role we are recruiting to will offer 1 to 1 support alongside groups support if needed and will be fully trained to a high standard to ensure the best from this role.

We are working across Rochdale on the UNICEF Breastfeeding accreditation and also on an equipment loan scheme. We have established funding for this but awaiting new recruit in place as lead to move this forward properly.

The antenatal offer is being reestablished and trials of the new offer have been rolled out in Heywood to begin with. We want to build on the antenatal offer via the Health Visiting parenting lead.

Amanda Hadlow, Infant feeding lead, specialist midwife Having been in the role since 2018 I am ensuring that referral pathways for infant feeding are done in the correct way and









that women can be seen in a timely manner.

I run 2 clinics per week offering face to face, one to one appointment that vary form 30 mins to 1 hour. I see approx. 12-15 women each week in these clinics alongside offering telephone support. Mums need as much support as they can get alongside the correct assessment of their feeding needs.

One of my clinics is at Croft Shifa in Rochdale Town Centre and the other in Middleton.

Locally I ensure that the Health Visiting teams are up to date and each year run training and refreshers in latch, attachment, positioning, problems, mastitis etc.

Currently have a breast pump loan scheme that can be accessed if there is a medical need to pump e.g. neonatal baby or low birth weight. 2-week loans. Very limited on equipment as vast area to cover and then items not returned. We don't just dump any old pump on a new mum, We don't give out a pump without looking at the cause of the reasons why she is requesting one, we would then work with them to work out what is right for them.

we work with them to suss out what is right for them. Pumps need to be accompanied with a package of care.

With the offer Stacey mentioned before, with the new scheme once up and running we will be asking for a voluntary contribution of £10 to loan the pumps, this will help keep the scheme sustainable and they will have a more digital system to sign in and out and monitor where they are.

Leona: How often is support available and what are the time frames involved?

Amanda: Monday to Friday the duty hub where I am based can be contacted.

Evening and weekend it is the National Breastfeeding helpline.

Once a referral is made to myself, I aim to assess and see mum within the week. But very much assessed on a needs basis if urgent would hope to see sooner.

Stacey: With the new roles coming into place, the offer is to hopefully extend the role of what Amanda does so brilliantly to further give that support in the evening or at a weekend where it currently has a gap in the service for one-to-one support.

Denise: Please can I ask how do you monitor the pumps going out?

Amanda: The pumps are numbered, and we loan them out and match the pump number to the baby NHS number. The Health Visitor collects form the Middleton









Office and ensure that the mum receives it. They can also be taken to nearest Health Visiting Centre if that is easier. Again, these pups are given to women from a health visitor and shown how to use, leaflets, telephone help numbers and links also provided.

They will keep the pump for 2 week, be monitored and assessed in between and then they are returned after 2 weeks (in theory).

Stacey: I have to say that the amazing job that Home Start do with their infant feeding offer and Loan scheme is something we took as good practice and have based our new model on. We have currently got an order in for 6 pumps per neighbourhood (30 pumps inn total)

The new Infant Feeding Support workers will have responsibility as part of their role, to be in charge of the loan offer.

Rachel: One thing that we know is that hospital discharge and early help feeding intervention is vital. With these new roles in place, they are going to be working closely and in partnership with all the people already in place at the moment, this will ensure we can build on what we already have to make it better.

Leona: We generally get very good and positive feedback around the









breastfeeding offer and support from Oldham residents. We are looking forward to the positive feedback coming in from Rochdale.

Josie: I accessed a lot of support from Home Start infant feeding team in Oldham, including a home visit, baby bistros and pump hire. A close friend who had a baby not long after me (Feb 23) and lives in Rochdale really struggled to find similar support, so it's great to hear that this is happening for Rochdale mum's too! Jess: Whilst I was in Tameside Hospital, I had great support from home start to help me get going with breast feeding, but when I came home to Heywood it all stopped and I had nothing, really struggled and didn't know where to turn. I did access the feeding clinic for CMPA and that was fantastic!

Jo Mayall, Infant Feeding specialist, Oldham NCA

Oldham also has Family Hubs and it is vital that we work closely with HomeStart. They offer so much they have an embedded baby bistro, peer support and various ways to contact for support.

Really keen to try to increase the uptake to the breast-feeding support offer, people sign up then don't attend very frustrating. We are currently encouraging people to share their feedback around frustrations









with the tongue tie and advising they go to PALS with their feedback or complaint. Again, as said earlier, evidence for a need of this service is key.

We produce a quarterly newsletter. Currently have a consultation out and it is important that families use their voices to have their say on the local 11 children's centre and their future.

Very proud of the uptake of the Healthy Start scheme in Oldham we are above national average and currently have 75% uptake on it. When it switched to the new card version, uptake did drop for a while but pleased its back on the rise.

We collate breastfeeding data, there has been a steady rise over quarter 1 and 2. 43% are seen within 6-8 weeks of birth for support.

Currently a new task and finish group in January 2024 around antenatal pathways.

Through the Northern Care Alliance been working on a new breast/chest feeding policy and it has been great to work with such good staff.

Leona: It is wonderful to hear such positivity from Oldham, if Rochdale could mirror this it would be really good.









Leona, ROMVP Lead

Denise: Homestart have funding via Oldham and Tameside to offer online Antenatal. These are generally after the 20week appointment and on Sunday Morning online. These can be a little challenging due to no shows or people not putting camera on throughout. There is a wide range of things that let people know about it – banner, posters, leaflets and via social medias.

Service user experience/Feedback

When delivered baby, midwife told lady she had inverted nipples so they would make breastfeeding harder. Was given no additional information. Stayed in Hospital for 9 days and within that time only accessed 30 mins of support via specialist feeding midwife. Various requests for support not helpful as leaflets aiven were not tailored to physiological need. Feeding wasn't the issue - the inverted nipples were and as this had been said it had sowed the seeds of that she couldn't do it.

Approached several other hospital staff during stay – none of whom helped her lots of missed opportunity for intervention. Found it very traumatic as wanted to feed her baby.









Felt very embarrassed contacting the national BF helpline as felt shame. Was given access to pump in hospital however it was shared as there is not enough pumps which made it harder to express as had to ask for access every time.

Needed support on discharge and doesn't feel like this was given, numerous opportunities to refer for support. Doesn't want others to go through this experience.

Jo: I can imagine this was very distressing. I know - as we all know - midwives are currently rushed off their feet. Although this is no excuse. A health visitor should have also been to see this lady at 10 – 14 days after birth and should have supported. Steph: This has really upset me; we need to do better by these women!

Breastfeeding Welcome Scheme, Rochdale **Denise**: I find this frustrating. We give out lots of things to the Trust to ensure that women have the help they need from ourselves upon discharge. Something has been missed here. Very upsetting for her I imagine, and we could have ensured a better BF journey.
